The Wedding at Cana

In the Gospel reading today, Jesus, his mother and his disciples are present at a wedding at Cana. According to the Gospel of John, the first of the signs or miracles of Jesus takes in the context of a wedding and the last of his signs takes place in the context of a funeral, the death of his friend Lazarus. Jesus was present to his people in times of joyful celebration and in times of harrowing grief. The Lord is powerfully present to us in those times that engage us to the very depts of our being, times of new beginning and of significant transition.

That is why many of the sacraments of the church mark those key moments of our existence: **Baptism** for the moment of birth and new life; **Confirmation** for the moment when we pass out of childhood into adolescence; **Marriage** and **Ordination** for those moments of commitment that shape the remainder of our lives and the lives of others; the **Sacrament of the Sick** for the moments we are brought face to face with our physical vulnerability, our mortality. The remaining two sacraments, **Eucharist** and **Penance**, are not so much for those special experiences of life. They are given to us for our day to day living.

The story of the Wedding at Cana reminds us that Jesus is present to us at all the significant moments of our lives and his presence makes all the difference in the world. Fr Martin Hogan
