We can all think of people who have shown us hospitality over the years. Such hospitality may have taken a whole variety of forms, apart from food for the table. We appreciate those who make us feel at home when we move into a new situation, whether it be a new home, a new job or a new responsibility. **We value those who are hospitable towards us when we need a listening ear.** Such welcome responses are all expressions of that giving of the cup of cold water that **Jesus** speaks about in today's gospel reading.

**Jesus** who came to serve and not to be served was himself very appreciative of the cup of cold water from others. In the heat of the sun he asked the **Samaritan woman** for a drink; he welcomed the hospitality of **Martha** and **Mary** & momentary relief when **Simon of Cyrene** who helped him carry his cross.

### The Latest.....

From Monday a priest can celebrate Mass with a congregation, but must follow the rules laid down.

Every second seat must be left vacant. People must stay **6 feet apart** but family groups can sit together. That reduces the capacity of our church to **60, approx.**

Worshippers must enter the **main door** only and exit by the side doors. There will be **sanitizing gels** at the doors.

All who are elderly, vulnerable or feel unwell should **pray at home.** **There is no obligation to attend Mass at this time.**

The first week-end Mass open to the public will be celebrated on the week-end of **July 4/5** (next weekend) at the usual times; **vigil 7.00pm & Sunday at 10.30am.**

**Confirmation;** Friday August 21<sup>st</sup>. There will be three celebrations, 12 noon, 2.00pm and 4.00 pm.
